The detailed information below is offered to alert you all to the fact that the plenary papers will be published in the forthcoming November 2024 issue of the Journal (<u>Articles & Chapters:</u> journal of analytical psychology: Search (wiley.com).

For four days in early April, analysts and students from around the world gathered at Essex University Business School for the Journal's XVI<sup>th</sup> International Conference.

Attending both in person and online, attendees engaged in daring discussions, debates and workshops, exploring clinical, theoretical, cultural and political implications for analytical psychology when we cross borders of identity. Papers addressed cultural complexes, that social construct we call race, cultural expressions of trauma, gender fluidity and expansiveness, and working within and across different faiths.

On Thursday, a pre-conference day, Liz Brodersen, Christopher Carter and Helen Morgan gave presentations and workshops on the topic of cultural complexes and race for in-person attendees. The workshops were marked by open and frank conversation on the nature of taboo, implicit racial bias in training, and personal exploration of our own identities.

Renos Papadopoulos, Founder and Director of PPS "Centre for Trauma, Asylum and Refugees" and the MA and PhD in "Refugee Care" opened the conference with a talk devoted to cultural expressions of trauma. PPS Lecturer Monica Luci presented on *Disputed Boundaries of the Self, the Group, and their Environment: What we Learn from Refugees about Trauma, War and Culture*, and Karin Fleischer spoke on *Stolen Identities, Suspended Lives: Embodied Analysis with Victims of Early Trauma Due to State Terrorism.* 

Andrew Samuels, former Professor of PPS, closed out the day with a provocative and compelling talk: On Analytical Psychology and Politics: A Cutting Edge and Transformative Contribution—OR A Narcissistic Total Waste of Time Only of Interest to Some Analysts and Therapists?

Addressing gender fluidity and Self in culture, Robert Tyminski spoke on *Humanizing Different Archetypal Expressions of Gender Expansiveness* and Jay Barlow, Director of the SAP Training, spoke on *Engendering Identity when Boundaries Confirm an Exiled Self*.

The final day of the conference covered questions of faith and witnessed presentations by Les Stein on *The Self in the Consulting Room. The Power of Crossing Borders* and Murray Stein on *The Faithless Analyst*.

In amongst these key topics were a significant number of breakout sessions in which, amongst others, Lecturers of PPS, Roderick Main and Mark Saban, Honorary Member of Staff, Steve Myers, and students, Sulagna Sengupta and Jingchao Zeng, all spoke.

A lively and challenging four days of dialogue were supplemented by a social dreaming matrix run by SAP member Ali Zarbafi, which, as social dream matrices always do, captured deeply meaningful and relevant symbolism and collective concerns influencing and being influenced by the conference topics and process.

# ANNOUNCEMENT: Introduction of Pat Berry for IRSJA LIFE MEMBER By Lucie Magnus

I first "met" Pat in the pages of
Thomas Moore's book, The Care of the
Soul, in the early 1990s. By that time Pat
had already served as President of the
IRSJA for 4 years.



The first time I saw Pat was from afar when she was greeted enthusiastically by colleagues in the roof top swimming pool at the San Antonio hotel at the spring meeting in 2002. I have to admit I was a bit awe struck.

Later that week I finally met Pat in person as an examiner for the dream exam.

This was my first real live, up close and personal experience of her. As an examiner, she was penetrating and kind. She was perceptive and incisive and she treated me with respect and good humor. Her attitude made my failure bearable.

My next experience of Pat was as mentor. Her commitment to training, her love of the work and her generosity in passing on the craft of Jungian analysis was evident in her openness to work with me for hours on weekends. She listened with a piercing presence that made the time spent with her working cases exhilarating and delightfully terrifying. During those times in Maine, when we were not engaged in case work, she

shared oral history about the early New York Jungians and directed me to the Bailey Island Library where Jung visited.

I next experienced Pat as colloquium leader. She provided a safe psychological environment where we could risk being open and vulnerable. Pat led with her intensity and curiosity. She tracked the archetypal energies in our group and in our case work. Pat not only gave each of us undivided and equal attention, she opened her cozy home in the Maine woods to us. She took us on boat rides, She fed us with delicious chowders, and kept a fire burning in the hearth, both literally and symbolically. She nurtured the flame of Jungian work in each of us. Her hospitality of soul created a container where we could continue to develop, as individuals and into a community.

I then worked with Pat as a colleague when we worked on the EC together in her second 4-year term as president. At our first meeting she warned us that she was the girl in her neighborhood that the mothers would not let their daughters play with. I knew I was in the right place at the right time when she said that. My mother had always warned me about girls like her. Working with her was an experience I will always treasure. She was passionate, ornery, open, tough, tender, and visionary. She didn't suffer fools lightly but her curiosity, creativity and always that presence were all in service to Psyche. She taught me that Psyche happens. She embodied strategy and fluidity. The time on that EC was challenging and never boring. The invitational was born during those years. Our last meeting as an EC was in Birmingham, and Pat was in a great deal of pain. She was courageous and tenacious and, as we say in the football

South, she left it all on the field. I will never forget watching her painfully hobble out the last business meeting.

She recovered and I have seen her less throughout these last years. My time as acolyte, examinee, mentee, trainee and finally colleague have been formational. Pat leads by leading her life, following her inner guide, listening to her body's wisdom, trusting Psyche. It is a privilege to speak about my experience of her. Pat's journey continues as she, in Tennyson's words, "drinks life to the lees". She was here in the early years, she travels the world, outer and inner, and yet, she always come back here. The IRSJA is her home town. She comes and goes from here.

Shirley M. Fontenot May 25, 1935 - March 6, 2024

Shirley M. Fontenot was born on May 25, 1935, to Curtis and Marie (Ortego) Fontenot in Villa Platte, Louisiana. She was one of the youngest of six children. She lived in University City, MO, with her long-term partner, Rose. Shirley was a "small" extraordinary woman. She became a Catholic nun, entering the convent immediately after high school. She taught first grade for 16 years and often said her finest education came by way of the many children who passed through her classroom. During her time in the convent, she also earned her bachelor's and master's degrees in education.

Shirley left the order after 26 years and moved from Louisiana "Cajun Country" to Chicago to pursue her interest in Jungian Psychology. During the next 20 years, she completed master's degrees in both Pastoral Studies and Divinity, as well as a doctorate in ministry, and worked as a psychotherapist. In 1993 she earned a diploma as a Jungian Analyst and enjoyed this profession for nearly 30 years. She was engaged in some form of formal education for one-third of her life. She semi-retired at age 87.

In 1996 she met and fell in love with Rose Holt, who was studying Jungian Psychology in Chicago. Shirley enjoyed a rich and fulfilling life with Rose. They moved to St. Louis, Missouri in 2003. The two of them would enjoy hours of deep conversations about theology, psychology, family, and all facets of life, often during a shared meal at dinner time. Her favorite place to visit was Sedona, Arizona, where she and Rose enjoyed vacationing many times. In her later years,

traveling became more difficult for Shirley but she and Rose spent many hours enjoying each other's company and playing card games, Scrabble and most recently, Rummikub. She was a quiet contender.

Shirley also loved her annual family reunions. Coming from a family of 5 siblings, Shirley had many nieces, nephews, great nieces and great nephews, and great grandnieces and great grandnephews, all of whom adored her and whom she adored. They would often come to St. Louis to visit, and Shirley always looked forward to their visits. She never forgot where she came from and remained humble and kind her entire life.

Shirley was a collector of items of a religious nature, especially angels. She was an avid reader of fiction and focused on historical fiction. The Harry Potter books were her favorites, and she led many adult seminars weaving Potter and Jungian themes. In some mystical way she was able to bring together all she had learned from first graders, all she had gleaned from decades sitting in classrooms, and all that her clients taught her into a wisdom that many recognized and drew from.

Shirley passed away at the age of 88 on March 6, 2024, at Missouri Baptist Medical Center and will be greatly missed by all who knew her. She is survived by her sister, Rosie (Tee) Eichler, her partner Rose Holt, along with many nieces and nephews. She is preceded in death by her parents, her sisters Anne Bordelon, Estelle Hoskinson and Loretta Landry and her brother, Frank Fontenot.

A joy-filled Memorial Service, celebrating Shirley's amazing life and boundless love, was held on April 6 at the First Congregational Church of St. Louis. Sheldon Culver officiated the service on behalf of Shirley and Rose's families and numerous friends. Those attending included many members of the C. G. Jung Society of St. Louis and the Heartland Association of Jungian Analysts (HAJA) Participants.

When things go well in the analysis, they carry the reparative aspects of one's actual parents. So their loss reverberates deeply with earlier personal losses. Tom Lavin was this and so much more to me. In alchemy, one name for the Stone, the Self, is orphan. This recognizes the fact that in the individuation process one becomes less dependent on others; one becomes pared down to the bare essentials. When one loses one's parents, one can never return home again; when one loses one's analyst, one can never return to your shared 'well-sealed vessel'. A peculiar aspect of a training analysis is that it often allows another kind of relationship to develop after the analysis ends. You become colleagues often working on committees and attending social events together. And if you are lucky enough, you can become friends. This was the case with Tom and me. I will miss his Irish sense of humor, his stories, his smile, his relational warmth, and his intelligence. Go in peace Thomas, my father in spirit.

#### ROLLOUT OF REVISED IRSJA TRAINING TRANSCRIPT

Dear Candidates and Local Training Seminar Coordinators:

The Training Committee has revised and standardized the IRSJA Training Transcript based on user feedback. The revised Transcript features input into a fillable PDF form, more rows for information, a process to complete the form, and a process for signatures. Instructions on filling out the form are included in Appendix D, page 60 of the new <a href="Training Manual">Training Manual</a> dated 2024.06.01, posted on the IRSJA website. Candidates admitted in April 2024 will complete their first Transcript for the 2024-2025 Training year.

The Training Committee offers a Procedure explaining how each Candidate will access the revised IRSJA Training Transcript in Adobe. Adobe will send each

Candidate an email giving access to the Transcript form embedded in Adobe. One need not have an Adobe account to complete the Transcript form in Adobe.

Linked here is the procedure entitled <u>"2024.05.30 PROCEDURE TRANSCRIPT"</u>

COMPLETION AND SIGNING," which will be posted on the IRSJA website.

After the Candidate completes the form, the Candidate will receive another email to sign the form. After the Candidate signs the form, it will flow to the email of the Local Training Seminar leader (or their designee), or the IRSJA Director of Training, respectively.

Candidates and Local Training Seminars may decide to support first-time users with Local Training Seminar volunteers who are comfortable with fillable PDF forms.

Thank you to each person who suggested improvements to the Transcript. The Training Committee moves forward with that same process improvement mindset.

From our Bylaws, the definition and scope of our Affiliate Members.

#### 1. Rights and Obligations

"Affiliate members may attend Society meetings, participate in discussions of a scientific or cultural nature, and may serve in a consulting role on committees as appointed by the President. Affiliates may not vote, hold office, or attend business meetings. They shall pay the normal dues of Active members, shall abide by the ethical standards of the Society, and shall sign the same Waiver and Release Form required of Active members within 30 days of date of receipt. They are not required to maintain the attendance standards. Except as described herein, Affiliate members are bound by all rules and regulations of the Society. (Amendment III: April 2006) "

I am happy to introduce Hallie Durchslag, our new Affiliate Member, to those of you not in attendance at our Fall meeting.

#### From Hallie:

Thanks to Marla for suggesting I share just a bit about myself.

I have been in private practice as a Jungianbased psychodynamic psychotherapist since 2010. I am originally from, and currently live, in my home town of Cleveland. This has given me the honor of spending the better part of 20 years in community with many of the analysts involved in the Pittsburgh Seminar, in part due to my involvement within Cleveland's own Jungian organization, The Jung Educational Center of Cleveland. I began volunteering with Jung Cleveland just as I was starting my first analysis, back in 2003. I would eventually serve as secretary, vice-president, then president of that organization. Now, I am truly excited to be involved with this new community – with IRSJA - and to have the ability, through my membership, to say "our" community.



For 8 years after earning my Master of Science in Social Administration (M.S.S.A) at the Mandel School of Applied Social Sciences, Case Western Reserve University Cleveland, OH (1999), my social work career was focused on macro-level interventions, including community planning and research; development; and non-profit management. But my choice to move into clinical practice – which kindled the desire to understand clinical theory at a much deeper level than offered through my Master's program – left me torn between joining an analyst training program or working toward a PhD.

As Marla has so carefully explained, my status as an affiliate member of IRSJA is because I am not a Jungian Analyst. Instead of joining an analyst training program, I chose to attend Pacifica Graduate Institute, Carpinteria, CA, where I earned my PhD in Clinical Psychology with an Emphasis in Depth Psychology (2015). While there will always be some regret in giving up the distinguished honor of becoming an analyst, that decision holds a great deal of purpose in my own development.

My personal experience with Bipolar I Disorder has plunged me into an unfriendly struggle between psychiatry and analytical psychology. I felt that Pacifica's educational curriculum would allow more room to live through that dichotomy. As example, I was able to train within the Intensive Outpatient Program (IOP) at Case Western Reserve University Hospitals Department of Psychiatry and Mood Disorders Program. I was on the front lines of mutual disdain between the psychoanalytic and psychiatric communities, and I continually mined the conflict for inroads and common ground. My book, *The Collective Unconscious in the Age of Neuroscience: Severe Mental Illness and Jung in the 21st Century* (Routledge, 2021) was intended to spark more discussion on the subject. It was extremely gratifying that the book was recognized as a finalist in the clinical category of the 2022 International Association of Jungian Studies (IAJS) Book Awards.

Most gratifying, however, is that after grappling with Jungian theory in such a deep way, I discovered Jung's own desire for an alliance between medical and psychoanalytical models of treating severe mental illness. I see his late exploration of a psychoid archetype as a crowning move toward the understanding that body chemistry holds its own relationship to Self.

I look forward to starting my next chapter of inquiry and study in the company of the IRSJA community. I have two meetings "under my belt" now, as the saying goes. Both the Pittsburgh Fall Meeting and the Spring Meeting in Santa Fe were marked with an amazing energy that seems to emanate through camaraderie, mutual respect and care, and remarkable intellectual acumen. It really is an incredible honor to be one of few affiliate members voted in. I look forward to seeing you in Minneapolis!
