Michael Fordham Prize 2023

We congratulate Leigh Money on winning the Michael Fordham Prize 2023 with her beautifully written paper "Labels and the Self: Identity Labels as Scaffold", published in June 2023, 68(3), 590–609: https://doi.org/10.1111/1468-5922.12922. This paper includes impressive clinical material and takes a positive and symbolic stance towards self-assigned labels such as "neurodiverse", "genderfluid", "sex-

positive", "ADHD", and "highly sensitive". By using scaffolding as a metaphor for allowing growth or development to take place (or compensate for its absence), Leigh shows the phenomenon of self-labelling as fulfilling different functions. The Clinical Commentaries case offers a courageously written vignette wherein issues of an unconscious-to-unconscious linkage in the field manifests through a sadomasochistic mode of relating.

The April edition is a Special Issue: *Analysis & Activism: Do We Really Have the Answer?* – featuring plenary papers from the 5th Analysis and Activism Conference held in Ljubljana, Slovenia, in September 2023. The conference and this special issue explore our role as psychoanalysts and activists. Do we really have the answer in today's unhinged and out-of-joint world? Can psychoanalysis be an active part for/of change? What can analysis achieve, alone or with allies? Does psychoanalysis have an effect on the socio-political-economical realm? What anxieties does the synergy between psychoanalysis and activism evoke? And above all, is psychoanalysis an agent of change and if so, in what way? The papers in this issue represent a rich tapestry of thought embracing the profound connection between the inner world of

the psyche and the outer dynamics of politics – and consider everything from cultural complexes, archetypal evil, war and the totalitarian state of mind, to the CARE system as a counterbalance to destruction. The Film & Culture section explores the emergent relationship between a work of modern visual art and a deeply engaged viewer, looking at the potential "thirdness" in the field between viewer and viewed. Three essays discuss works by Willem de Kooning (his controversial painting *Woman I*), Ilana Savdie (her disturbing painting *Lagrimas y Mocos*), and the *oeuvre* of Maggi Hambling, painter and sculpture.


Flying Saucers: A Modern Myth of Things Seen in the Skies In Person + Zoom January 25, 2025 1 pm - 4 pm

In Jung's view, the "Saucer epidemic," particularly the numerous reports occurring in the United States, brought forth many issues of relevance to analytical psychology. In his essay, Flying Saucers, Jung focused on these issues through his "thematic idea of the individual self [who is] struggling to achieve wholeness, and producing, when frustrated in its struggle, neurotic projections of various kinds". Jung proposed the concepts of visions versus hallucinations and of 'borderline' realities, the fiction of 'normality', and discussed the spiritual hunger that erupts from our "extremely scientific, technological culture." If this was Jung's view in 1958, what is emerging in our current time? The panel presentations will explore past and recent reports released by the U.S. government about unidentified anomalous phenomena. Together we will reflect on Jung's essay, its applicability to clinical work, and the experiences of people striving for wholeness in today's society-at-large.

Announcing the release of *The Healing Power of Community Mutual Aid, AIDS and Social Transformation in Psychology* by Lusijah Marx, Graham Harriman and Robin McCoy Brooks (Routledge, 2025).



The Healing Power of Community grew out of our collaborations at the height of the AIDS crisis, from which Project Quest, an HIV/AIDS clinic, was established in 1989. We asked ourselves how the liberatory emergence of "Quest" can be applied to psychology today. I, (Robin McCoy Brooks) in particular address how analytical psychology and experiential group therapy is particularly relevant in group practice and advocate for broadening the scope of psychoanalysis beyond the needs of the individual alone. Each of us argues for the urgent need to place mutual aid approaches at the very center of our clinical practice, advocacy, training, how we meet professionally, and conduct research. Thus, we focus on the application of mutual aid-based approaches in group and community psychology (including psychoanalysis) as remedy to our culture's retreat into individualism, societal breakdown of community,

and collective loss of *Eros*.



C. G. Jung Award 2024: Sonu Shamdasani

Sonu Shamdasani (MSc, PhD), a London-based author, editor-in-chief, and professor at University College London, will be honored as the next recipient of the IAJS annual C. G. Jung Award and will give his C. G. Jung Memorial Keynote Address at the IAJS online conference, Jung and Duality, December 6-8, 2024. In giving this award to Dr. Shamdasani, the IAJS recognizes the impressive contribution he has made to the field of Jungian and post-Jungian studies. His scholarly contributions have brought unprecedented opportunities for accurate, original source material for academics and clinicians interested in Jungian psychology. Additionally, his insights into and interpretation of the writings and thoughts of C. G. Jung, as well as the relationship he has built with the Jung family, have elevated the works of C. G. Jung and the field of analytical psychology to even greater prominence and stature.

Sonu is a Sindhi who was born in Singapore and then grew up in England. He gained his BA from Bristol University in 1984, followed by an MSc in the History of Science and Medicine at University College London/Imperial College London. Later, he was awarded a PhD in the History of Medicine from the University College London's Wellcome Institute for the History of Medicine.

In 2000, Dr. Shamdasani had arranged to begin work editing Jung's The Red Book. In 2003, Dr. Shamdasani founded, along with Stephen Martin, the Philemon Foundation, which sought to publish all of Jung's works. Dr. Shamdasani commenced as Editor of the Philemon Foundation's successful project to publish, in 2009, The Red Book and continues now his labors at Philemon as

the foundation's General Editor. He is also the author of several books, Cult Fictions: C. G. Jung and the Founding of Analytical Psychology, Jung and the Making of Modern Psychology: The Dream of a Science, Jung Stripped Bare by His Biographers, Even, and C. G. Jung. A Biography in Books as well as a co-author and editor of many additional books too numerous to list here. Currently, Dr. Shamdasani is a professor in the School of European Languages, Culture, and Society (SELCS) at University College London and the Director of the UCL Centre for the History of Psychological Disciplines.

Conference Theme

Jung emphasized the importance of 'making darkness conscious.' To facilitate the confrontation of the unconscious with consciousness, Jung involved a variety of practices such as active imagination, dream work, tending to the soul, alchemical transformation, and transpersonal techniques. In encountering the vast unconsciousness with the light, the psyche transforms, light learns from darkness, and darkness dares to lose some of its mystery. However, if left uncalibrated and unleashed, these encounters can lead to "the emergence of the unconscious opposite in the course of time" (Jung, 1990, Psychological Types. P. 426).

The conference theme addresses contemporary concerns in relation to the notion of the dualistic nature of contrasting elements. Together, we will contemplate how creatively addressing topics such as polarization, cancel culture, self-idolatry, individualization to the detriment of individuation, the need for duality to individuate (or not), and other relevant issues of modernity, which may reveal more profound organizing principles beneath the surface. Perhaps these themes are evidence of processes of individuation as the psyche guides us through these challenging experiences or the necessary obstacles in the *Nekiya*, consolidating our determination to individuate. These challenges include the theories of good and evil and how we may view them regarding transformation.

The approach of C. G. Jung teaches that a new symbol could emerge in the unfathomable moment when the dark flips into the light, the instant when the dark and the light are identical, a coincidence of opposites, *coincidentia oppositorium*. Chaos and creativity are closely related, so how do we address and embrace these elements in the current climate? How do our expectations shape their

encounters? How do we address collective shadows? A zeitgeist is the defining spirit or mood of a particular period of history, as shown by the ideas and beliefs of the time. Perhaps contrasting elements, complementarity, the dualistic nature of current cultural patterns, or other approaches might provide an opportunity to assimilate aspects that will create conscious awareness and support our collective advancement.



Announcing the forthcoming release of Thomas Elsner's new book, A FLASH OF GOLDEN FIRE: The Birth, Death, and Rebirth of the Modern Soul in Coleridge's "Rime of the Ancient Mariner," to be published by Texas A&M as part of the Fay Lecture and Book Series in October of 2024.



In the early twentieth century C. G. Jung survived an intense encounter with the unconscious. He did this by giving expression to his inner world in the paintings and dialogues found in *The Red Book*. Yet Jung felt alone in this work, unable to find a precedent or cultural parallel, until he discovered alchemy. This ancient "protoscience" became the bridge Jung had been seeking between the remote past and the present. Yet between the downfall of alchemy in the eighteenth century and Jung's Red Book in the twentieth, it seems that there was a gap in the tradition.

Samuel Taylor Coleridge's great visionary poem "The Rime of the Ancient Mariner" is another link in that golden chain. Coleridge's 19th century night-sea journey can today be understood as a symbolic self-portrait of the collective unconscious, a self-portrait that, like *The Red Book*, finds its historical context and continuity in the alchemical tradition. Insofar as Coleridge's *Ancient Mariner* symbolically describes the birth of the modern soul, it is grounded in the factual knowledge of European history. **Insofar as it describes the death and rebirth of the modern soul**, *The Ancient Mariner* is prophecy and revelation.

A Message from Tom:

I hope that readers will gain an understanding of the psychological meaning of archetypal symbolism and its relationship to visionary poetry, modern society, and their personal lives. This includes a new understanding of the depth psychological meaning of Coleridge's visionary poem and its collective significance, as well as a new understanding of the roots of Jungian psychology in Romantic literature. I hope that readers will learn of the relevance and value of Coleridge's visionary poetry as a real, true, beautiful, and terrifying expression of what it means in the modern Western world to develop the full potential of our own minds.

C. G. Jung and Martin Luther King Jr. warned us in the 1950s and '60s that for our very survival's sake Western society must figuratively die to old values and give birth to new values. Coleridge's Ancient Mariner shows us the way. The Mariner's night-sea journey is not a journey of increasing intellect, making more money, acquiring more power, or better adapting to the *status quo ante* but of developing beyond traditional religious, scientific, and political dogmas, becoming more conscious of what it is to be a human being, and thus becoming a vessel for a new consciousness currently evolving out of the collective unconscious in today's world.

Christiana Morgan: The Tower Project

Christiana Drummond Councilman Morgan (1897-1967) was a Boston psychologist and artist who analyzed with Jung; her psychic visions and art were the foundation of Jung's Visions Seminars (1930-1934). Morgan later co-authored the Thematic Apperception Test (TAT) at Harvard and, inspired by Bollingen, built a Tower in Newbury, MA. Every architectural, artistic, and landscaping detail was crafted by Morgan in service to the individuation process begun in her analysis with Jung.

Jung considered Morgan a "pioneer woman" and manifestation of *une femme inspiratrice*. Her contributions were instrumental in developing Jung's theories, especially establishing the archetypal basis of the unconscious, his concept of the anima, and the use of active imagination in therapy. Nevertheless, Jung viewed Morgan's role as a muse to powerful men, a perception that overshadowed her substantial psychic and intellectual contributions to the development of 20th century psychology.

Christiana Morgan bequeathed the Tower and grounds to an abutting secondary school, the Governor's Academy, stating her wish that it become a center of artistic and scholarly work congruent with her interests. Her work can now be realized with your help. A three-phase project has begun to renovate the Tower, ensure Morgan's rightful place in the history of depth psychology, and serve future scholars and artists:

- Phase 1: Professional inventory and assessment of the Tower
- Phase 2: Restoration of Tower architecture, artifacts, and gardens
- Phase 3: Create a teaching and research center emphasizing Morgan's life & work



The Governor's Academy has begun fundraising for the first stage and has received funding from the National Trust for Historic Places. We now seek donations from 50 or more members of the Jungian community. Grantors have asked for a demonstration of widespread support for the Tower from Jungians and other interested parties. Please be as generous as you can to help us meet an initial financial goal of \$50,000 to evidence Jungian support. You can, if you wish, donate anonymously; your name will not be shared. All donations are tax deductible and will be used to support the Tower project. IRSJA members Jan Marlan and Deb Stewart would be delighted to talk with you and answer questions.

TRAINING CORNER, FALL 2024

From Martha Blake, Director of Training:

Announcing the IRSJA Training Committee Plus Database!



In June 2022, the IRSJA Training Committee chartered a project to improve the quality of the training transcript completion and storage process. Among the Training Committee's objectives were:

- To simplify the process of maintaining an IRSJA Candidate transcript.
- To eliminate rework tasks that are replicated by IRSJA members in roles with responsibility for training because there is no centralized transcript database.
- To centralize the location of the Candidate transcript and other training-related documentation.
- To improve access to the Candidate transcript for those IRSJA volunteer members in roles that contribute to the Candidate transcript.
- To secure Candidate transcripts in the event of a force majeure event, ensure there is a backup copy of the transcript records.
- To identify a platform or platforms that will meet the needs of IRSJA users.

In May 2024, the Training Committee conducted five successful beta tests and implemented an Adobe Acrobat Pro transcript. The Adobe Acrobat Pro transcript failed to simplify the process and eliminate rework because a Candidate who signs an Adobe transcript that contains mistakes cannot edit the transcript after it is signed. In June and July, Candidates and Local Training Seminar Coordinators identified other opportunities to improve the training transcript and the process.

On August 24 and 30, the Director of Training, Martha Blake, hosted two "Voice of the Customer" Zoom meetings for Local Training Seminar Coordinators, Analysts, and Candidates to capture the learnings from the Adobe Acrobat Pro transcript process. Eleven people attended, and others sent suggestions by email.

Among the many suggestions were ideas to improve the process of completing the transcript:

- Program a transcript that can be signed and submitted by a Candidate, declined by a Local Training Seminar Coordinator, revised and re-revised by a Candidate, then signed by the Local Training Seminar Coordinator without starting over at the top and retyping every entry.
- Locate each Candidate's blank transcript for the current Training Year on a
 platform that the Candidate can access during the year so that the Candidate
 may add content over time. Consider the IRSJA Training Committee platform or
 a desk-top application that the Candidate files on the platform by the due date.
- Support cut-and-paste for Candidates who keep their training records in Excel or for Candidates whose Local Training Seminar provides a list of seminars/colloquia.
- Program a transcript in which the hours at the end of each row total automatically.

In August 2024, the Training Committee proposed and the Executive Committee endorsed a revised Project Charter: **IRSJA Training Committee Plus Database** to identify a vendor that:

- Can meet the needs of the Training Committee transcript, supporting documentation, filing, and retention process.
- May also simultaneously meet the needs of other IRSJA Committees who utilize Analysts, Local Training Seminar Coordinators, and Candidate emails to share forms and communications.

The Director of Training vetted five vendors.

On Friday, September 13, the Training Committee, Executive Committee, Local Training Seminar Coordinators, Candidate Reps, and contributing Candidates met with three vendors to consider their capacity to support IRSJA's need for a software platform to retain training and support documentation safely in an easy-to-use, confidential, compliant database system.

2024.09.01 Review Committee Coordinator Report

All IRSJA Review Committees are gearing up for the 2024 Fall Conference and annual interviews with all candidates, including those on leaves of absence. Eight committees currently have five candidates, except for two committees, which have four candidates. We rely on substitute analysts for absences and conflicts of interest. Please let Mary Coady-Leeper know if you want to volunteer to be on a Review Committee.

In the early 2010's, the Review Committee's role changed from that of gatekeeper to primarily being in a role to "advise, support, and mentor" candidates through the training process. At the annual fall meeting, candidates relay their goals for the upcoming year, especially if they hope to take the Propadeuticum Exams or are ready to form cases and/or thesis committees. The Review Committee Chairs relay this information to the Director of Training. The Director of Training then supports the Propadeuticum Exam Chair and the Diploma Exam Chair as they meet the exam needs of candidates.

Since the IRSJA's inception, there has been a focus on developing analyst capacities based on a shared set of values concerning the analytic attitude. Carolyn Bates outlined these values at the 2024 spring meeting in Santa Fe, summarized from documents recorded in 1983 and 1985. Training committees continue to implement using the wording in the Analytic Capacities list to help mentor and evaluate candidates in their development toward certification.


