




Book Review of Gwendolyn's Quest: A Psychological Fable, by Robin van Loben Sels

When I first saw a copy of *Gwendolyn's Quest: A Psychological Fable*, I was immediately drawn to it's beautiful, wispy cover.

Reading the Fable, I found myself accompanying Gwendolyn as she left the patriarchy and struck out to find her own feminine way in the world. As Gwendolyn navigates new lands and challenges, she encounters many twists and turns and yet she doesn't lose her motivation to find her Prince.

Robin clarifies the details of Gwendolyn's consciousness as the Commentary begins. Gwen's symbols and dreams emerge, dissolve, and connect in a deep way to the world she lives in, adding depth to her feminine journey. The lovely illustrations weave their way with Gwendolyn's journey, offering additional windows into psychic life. Throughout the fable, dreams, symbols, and words themselves are tethered together with grace and soft reminders of ourselves as we navigate our own lives in the world we know today.



The Serpent and the Staff/The Mermaid and the Diver: Stalking the Roots of Psychoanalysis

Within a field which ostensibly aims its focus on the unknowability of a realm below the surface, the unconscious, but which continues its tradition of basing itself in a rational mode "above ground," ego consciousness, this book aims to "stalk the roots" of the psychoanalytic enterprise in a ground breaking manner. The goal is to bring to light foundational ancestors and agencies, invisible principles and ways of seeing, underlying attitudes and structures which make up the core of the analytic mind in its approach to the question, what heals? It starts with the ancient art of alchemy which integrates theory and practice, worker and worked upon, and moves from there to illustrate the nature of language as an undercurrent in the flow of the healing process.

Ritual and myth serve as guides into the core inter-relational nature of the psyche, as a "wilderness of mirrors," and finally *pathos*, experience itself in its essential leaning toward chaos. is presented as the psyche's "matter" being worked upon in the analytical mode. In short, "Stalking..." intends toward opening the vision of a field which daily grapples with the darkest "underworldly" aspects of the human soul, towards its *ur*, originary, depth and breadth. "By juxtaposing comparative material ...with a series of crystal-clear précis of the seminal insights of the principal theorists of the Freudian and Jungian traditions, the vicissitudes of the healing process are vividly born witness to by a master practitioner



Simone Campbell Scott

It is with great sadness that we learned of analyst Simone Campbell Scott's recent death. Simone died on May 16, 2025, after severe and unexpected complications while recovering in the hospital from an accident at home in Baltimore. Maryland. She was born on November 23, 1946, in Asheville, North Carolina. She trained and became a member of the Jungian Psychoanalytic Association (JPA) in New York. She was an active member of the Philadelphia Association of Jungian Analysts (PAJA) where she taught, supervised and held case colloquial for training candidates. She joined IRSIA in 2004 and many of us may fondly remember her in her various roles on IRSIA committees.

Obituary for Simone, courtesy Jeanne Creekmore

Simone Campbell Scott died on May 16, 2025, after severe and unexpected complications while recovering in the hospital from an accident at home in Baltimore, Maryland. She was born on November 23, 1946, in Asheville, North Carolina and traveled with her family to Knoxville, Tennessee where she graduated from the University of Tennessee with bachelor's degree in art history. She earned a master's in art history from Vanderbilt University and then began her first teaching job at age 23 in Florence, Alabama, teaching art history at the University of North Alabama. In 1984 she moved to Baltimore, Maryland where she met Tom Scott, an artist, painter, and Graduate Dean of Painting at Maryland Institute College of Art. She began studying for her second master's degree in social work at the University of Maryland. They married in 1987 and were together for nearly 30 years before his death in 2012.

Simone traveled to New York from Baltimore to study at the C.G. Jung Institute of New York, ultimately completing her psychoanalytic training in 2002. Her thesis as a candidate focused on the work of Mark Rothko—in particular, his world-renowned chapel in

Houston, Texas which drew on her grounding as a teacher of art history as well as her psychoanalytic work. In addition to her private practice in Baltimore, she became a member of the Jungian Psychoanalytic Association (JPA) in New York, where she participated in creating the first "Art and Psyche" conference. She joined IRSJA in 2004 and was an active member of the Philadelphia Association of Jungian Analysts (PAJA) where she taught, supervised and held Case Colloquia for candidates-in-training.

In her later years she completed a master's degree in poetry at the University of Baltimore and began to archive and catalog her husband's artwork. She also spent her time with her book club confidantes and many close friends—seeing concerts, art exhibits, having lunch and seeing movies. She continued to see patients until her death.

She is survived by her daughter Daniele, son-in-law Spencer, and grandchildren Casey and Charlotte, her two sisters, Michele and Monique, their husbands and children.

Sitting with Simone: A Remembrance of my Supervisor, Simone Campbell Scott
--Jeanne Creekmore
(Simone's words are in italics, below)

Simone lived in a grand three-story row house in Baltimore, just across from the Maryland College of Art and Design. She would answer the door, offer me tea, and invite me into her front room, a spacious area with wood floors, dark red woven rugs, and high white ceilings. The furniture included two very comfortable chairs that faced each other and a long sofa. To the right from where I sat was a sand tray and in the area behind it, filling the dormer window, were the miniatures. Behind her chair was a floor to ceiling bookcase that housed part of her extensive book collection. The other surfaces were covered with newspapers and magazines. After I was settled in my chair with my notebook on my lap, she'd bring out the tea and we'd begin.

Everything is up for conversation. You can talk about anything in here. It's worthy of paying attention to the questions.

As a candidate working with my control cases, I needed help in deepening the work of my clients, and Simone had a wealth of knowledge to share. She was a mother, a wife, a grandmother, an art historian, a social worker, and an analyst. While I was with her, she was also taking classes in poetry at the University of Baltimore. She was alive with the excitement of learning and every meeting was an opportunity for discovery. Under her tutelage, I was to learn the basics of conducting analysis, the nuts and bolts of what you do and say when you're in the consulting room.

The reason people come to analysis is that the story they're telling themselves about their lives isn't working.

Interpret her process to her: the stories she tells, her dreams and metaphors. This is how psyche is trying to communicate. Editing—that's what we're doing in here, editing your life so that it makes it work for you. We're working on the mythopoeic level.

As a mentee, I was picking up ways to approach my clients and their dreams. Simone had a very practical and simple way of speaking, making complex concepts clear to a beginner like me and my clients, most of who had never been in analysis before.

Every night the characters of our complexes appear on the stage in our dreams. We're trying to make conscious all these parts.

Our clients want us to say something that they can't think or say. They hired you to say what they didn't know. Find a way to say what you know and see. The client needs somebody outside their own world to say it back to them.

Simone was widely read. She paraphrased ideas from Jung and Hillman, and referenced Daniel Stern and Melanie Klein. She read the *New York* Times and delighted in sharing the latest scientific discovery. In response to the issues I described with my clients, she also referred to poets and novelists, artists and singers. For a patient going through a hard time, she had this image:

There is a line from Leonard Cohen's song: "There is a crack in everything, that's how the light gets in."

And if I—or my client—expected things to be neat and easy, she'd say: You can't make an omelet without breaking an egg.

Being a candidate wasn't easy—and Simone knew this, too. Her gaze also rested on me. She noticed my tiredness, empathized with the exhaustion of travel, and suggested that sometimes one only needed to read parts of books to get what was needed. She knew the power of connection and had a regular conversation with other analysts.

That's the gift of training: colleagues.

Simone often referred to the job of analysis as giving our clients a larger lens from which to view the world. But this was also her gift to me: a larger lens from which to work, to see my patients and myself, in the human condition.

But that's how we get deeper: connection and depth—through understanding the metaphorical learning about her life that she's giving you. It's all about connection: between me and her and her and everyone else.

It is with great sadness that we are announcing the recent death of Jung Education Center of Cleveland's founding influence, **Vocata George, PhD**.

Here are 2 remembrances about Vocata.

From Barbara Friedman, a founding Jung Cleveland board member

"Vocata was the first Jungian in Cleveland. Almost all, if not all, who became interested in C.G. Jung in Cleveland could be considered Vocata's legacy. Vocata was more in touch with the unconscious than anyone I have ever known. A bold, trail blazer. Her name Vocata was given to her by a renegade rabbi in a

shamanistic ritual in California in the 70s. Who else and where else? Her name means vocation and it is true. She held a lantern, guiding others into the depths. Many people are profoundly grateful to her for illuminating their journey. I am one of them."

From Rosemarie Paini, an early (and current) member of the Jung Cleveland Board

"Let yourself be drawn by the stronger pull of that which you truly love." -Rumi

"In 1989, C.G. Jung Educational Center was conceived and brought into form. It was a dream long carried by Vocata George, Ph.D. On April 28, 2025, Vocata George, Ph.D. passed peacefully of natural causes a few months before her 90th birthday.

She was born in West Virginia in a coal mining town. Her father was a coal miner. She was the older sister to her brother. She remembers her mother telling her fairy tales and shared her interest in wildflowers. She went by Sue George before being given the name Vocata in the mid 1970s. Her name comes from the Latin word that means "called," "invoked," "summoned."

Vocata earned her undergraduate degree in Art from Fairmount University. She found her calling in the areas of world religions, wisdom traditions, myths, symbols, fairy tales, and dreams, and their role in process of psychotherapy. She earned her Ph.D from the Institute of Transpersonal Psychology (now Sofia University) and an analyst's diploma from the Inter-Regional Society of Jungian Analysts.

Vocata was the founder and president of the C. G. Jung Educational Center of Cleveland, which she launched from her home in the suburbs of Cleveland. Her

vision, strong relationships, and respect for the power of Jungian thought evolved into what we call today Jung Cleveland. Vocata worked for decades in private practice, where she was profoundly gifted at helping others through a process of inner discovery of the meaning of dreams, visionary experiences, and depth psychology work."

Islands of Sanity and the Essence of Community

In preparation for crossing the border at the Pearson International Airport in Toronto, I was anxious. I didn't know what to expect. The news was saturated with stories of people trying to get into the United States from all over the world who were detained and questioned sometimes for weeks. My friends and family sent me news items that reinforced my fear and anxiety; they strongly recommended that I don't come to the Spring Meeting. It was a scary time.

In my imagination however, I pictured running a gauntlet from the Denver Airport to the boulder hotel, running behind enemy lines so to speak, to the community that I so dearly love.

My island of sanity.

It is during our closing reflection circle that we have faithfully entered into at the end of each meeting where I experience the magic and connection of our community, where the circle is the place where we practice love, respect and holding each other. This meeting, our island was further shored by the exceptional papers that offer critical and analytic perspectives of the times that we are living.

I learned about Margaret Wheatley's concept of "Islands of Sanity" several years ago and was struck by the possibility that communities could be created where groups of people strive to maintain humanity, compassion, and clarity amidst societal chaos and fragmentation. I have been part of so many dysfunctional groups especially other Jungian and other psychotherapy groups which fragment into personality, and polarizing perspectives.

In her book *Who Do We Choose to Be?*, Wheatley describes islands of sanity as intentional spaces—both internal and communal—where individuals uphold values like generosity, creativity, and kindness, even when the broader world feels volatile and disordered.

These islands are not about isolating oneself from the world's challenges but about creating environments where people can work together meaningfully, grounded in shared values and mutual respect. She asserts that leadership in such spaces requires an "unshakable faith in people's innate generosity, creativity, and kindness." These islands act as sanctuaries where the human spirit can thrive despite external turmoil.

The Monster and the Master

When the wind blows it shakes everything that is insecure, whether without or within. ... Thus the life of nations rolls on unchecked, without guidance, unconscious of where it is going, like a rock crashing down the side of a hill, until it is stopped by an obstacle stronger than itself.

—C. G. Jung, Wotan

It was 1937, Hitler's Germany. One aggressive act followed another, and the Nazimonster had grown to gigantic size, a Behemoth against who the single individual was helpless.

The Analytical Psychology Club of Berlin had planned a seminar with Dr. Jung for September of that year, in the auditorium of the TH [*Technische Hochschule* or Technical University] of Berlin, the Caltech or MIT of Germany. It seemed a gift from heaven to hear and meet Jung again now, when everything was devoured by collectivity. It was a time when the demonic powers not only stirred in the

unconscious, but had come to life, turned inside out, and walked the streets; a time when the individual and the individual way counted for nothing.

As fate would have it, another event took place in Berlin on the day when the seminar was scheduled to begin: the meeting of Hitler and Mussolini. A fantastic victory lane leading through the heart of the city had been feverishly produced, and adorned with the emblems of fascism. It was an avenue of more than a dozen miles, as only a Caesar, or perhaps a renaissance prince, could have conceived it. Thousands of workmen were employed to erect pompous statues, covered with banners. Their bases, however, revealed their essence, not marble but mere plaster of paris.

Hitler had set aside the evening of Jung's seminar for the victory parade that would also pass the very windows of the lecture hall where Jung talked. The city was unrecognizable that day. There were hundreds, thousands, and hundreds of thousands of people on their feet, intoxicated and frantic. Hitler had ordered the workers of every plant, the employees of every enterprise, the members of all political and private organizations to line the so-called victory lane. To be sure that no diversion was possible, he had closed all movies and theaters.

Miraculously, we were informed early that day that the only meeting to take place as scheduled was Jung's lecture. Since plans for it had been made long before, and since he was a scientist from a foreign country, it would have been unpolitic to cancel it. We were all there hours ahead of the starting time, for traffic had stopped and crowds had blocked the streets completely. The seminar began punctually and Jung's personality soon drew us away from the nightmarish outer scene into the reality of the inner realm, as he spoke on the manifestations of the self.

Then, as the evening went on, the monster outside began to stir. The howling of the masses and the Wotan-Nazi songs drowned out Jung. It was like a tidal wave that rolled on and on, enveloping everything in it, and burying everything beneath it. There it was: the enemy, the chaos, the collective power of the psyche in the raw, unleashed, with no attempt to channel it. Now it had even invaded this inner realm of ours, to which we clung so desperately.

The question arose within us: how will he react, this wise old man? He must say something. Surely he cannot just leave it untouched.

His voice was drowned out for many minutes, for a quarter of an hour, for an eternity. There he stood, waiting patiently, until gradually the monstrous tumult and frenzy subsided, the tidal wave ebbed. Then he said quietly, simply, "I am afraid we had to let world history pass by." With that, the vessel was restored.

Surely, the Nazi chapter of our history cost more than we can possibly imagine. Yet this remark of Jung's put the gruesome and gigantic happening of our time in its place. It enabled me, along with everyone present, to regain my own perspective to our century's tragedy; a perspective that permitted me to retain my sanity in the collective madness. The Training Committee, in collaboration with vendor KNVEY and 17 volunteer analysts and candidates, tested the transcript and identified opportunities for improvement. The new IRSJA transcript allows a Candidate to reenter the transcript and modify their input before it is signed by the Local Training Seminar and/or the Director of Training. After the new transcript rolls out, KNVEY will program a relational database that will provide users with secure storage for transcripts and supporting documents on a need-to-know basis.

At the request of the Candidate Representatives, the Training Committee endorsed attending an Allison Lecture by a newly graduated analyst may be declared as one didactic session on the IRSJA Transcript.

Another New Update from Martha:

TRANSCRIPT DOCUMENT FILE LABELS

Two years ago, IRSJA adopted the York Convention, a convention for labeling files **before** we email them to each other.

As we implemented the IRSJA Transcript +, our Vendor, KNVEY, observed that a database program could not read the spaces in the York Convention accurately.

Therefore, before you send the LTS Coordinator or the Director of Training a document, PLEASE label it according to this CONVENTION:

The Candidate last name and initial in sentence case, name the document in CAPS. NO SPACES. Use hyphens instead of a space.

Otherwise, when a database program perceives a space, it inserts symbols such as &*#\$@@&# instead of a space.

PLEASE USE THIS FORMAT TO LABEL FILES TO SEND TO THE DIRECTOR OF TRAINING FOR FILING:

I am part of the Memphis-Atlanta Seminar and am a Licensed Clinical Social Worker in private practice in Atlanta.


I work with adult individuals suffering with grief and overwhelm emanating from current and early childhood experiences.

Roma is a personal retelling of Alphonso Cuarón's childhood. Set in Mexico City in the early 1970s, it centers on a young indigenous woman who works as a maid for a middle-class white family that's falling apart.

"Roma" is a neighborhood in Mexico City where families live behind locked gates, and where maids, cooks, and drivers busily keep homes running. Cleo lives with and works for a multigenerational brood that scarcely seems capable of doing anything without her. From each dawn until long after dusk, she tends to the family and its sprawling two-story house. She serves meals, cleans away dog droppings, and carries laundry up to the roof, where she does the wash in view of other maids on other roofs with their own heavy loads.

Cleo represents an aspect of the Anima for the Mexican psyche, the dismembered feminine that is part of the mythology of Mexico, as seen in the myth of *Coyolxauhqui*.

In Cleo we see a character that is full of feeling but is never able to speak about her pain. Putting others' feelings and needs ahead of her own suffering. Nevertheless, for Cleo, her feelings are an asset, a source of power. "Calladita te ves mas bonita".

Cleo's story reaffirms the collective trauma experienced by the original people of Mexico and those currently living in the United States.

Gentleman's Agreement is an easy-to-watch, entertaining film: journalist Phil Green (Gregory Peck) takes on a high-profile magazine assignment about antisemitism. To view things from an empathetic perspective, he pretends to be Jewish.



The film was released in 1947, just after the end of the Holocaust. It courageously takes up the Jewish question, exploring the widespread, often subtle antisemitism expressed in "a gentleman's agreement," an unspoken understanding of quotas that limited Jewish people in areas of housing, employment, social circles, and education.

The film boldly discusses the ways people found it necessary to conceal their Jewish identity to navigate these stigmas and social barriers, often changing their last names to sound less Jewish and "pass." In this context, the film touches on Jewish self-hate, which emerges from societies' hierarchical devaluations. It also openly explores, in painful detail, the ways antisemitism manifests in everyday life among people who might not consider themselves overtly prejudiced, enlarging our social understanding of these exclusionary processes.

In recent times, antisemitism has been wildly and a proudly displayed as a courageous stand against colonialism, with being "Jewish" conflated with negative ideas about Zionism and Imperialism. Watching this film in 2025 offers us the possibility to further identify emergent forms of the Outsider archetype, showing how it has morphed to mirror the most despised characteristics in the present era.
